

Sunday, Oct. 26

Sunday morning and time to go to church. Since Yaeiko has been attending the University, she had not been able to find time to attend church with me.

19

Today she had to prepare for her exams coming up in a few days. I hope she might be able to study Mormonism up at the University where Theology will be taught <sup>from</sup> this year.

19

Enjoyed the privilege of administering <sup>to</sup> the Sacrament this morning with Brother Koroki. In our Book of Mormon class Elder Willis explained the Plan of Salvation with a diagram giving us a vivid picture of the different stages of

men's progress. Sister Mary Higgins attended church <sup>for the first time in a long while.</sup> <sup>She</sup> took Gene to the library <sup>to</sup> look up some books for her book report (in the pm.)

Tomie is still very much in the same condition but M. has made great improvement.

Attended the Sunday night sacrament service at the Chapel. Sunday, Oct. 26

Back to HNB Camp on bus at 11 pm.

Monday, Oct. 27

Up at 5:30 am with the rest of the men.

Our communication & anti-tank platoons are going out Kailua & Kuimandlo for a four day problem. Fell in bed at 6 am. At 7 am.

A reported on sick call to be taken to the Post Hospital for an <sup>(eye)</sup> ~~Presbyopia~~ examination. Dr. Lambert examined me and set an <sup>early</sup> appointment so I will be called soon to be operated upon. Walked to the Radio School <sup>and was in time</sup> for the last morning period.

In the afternoon, went for another examination at the Hospital. Since I was to be hospitalized soon I thought I might be circumcised <sup>\*</sup> at the same time and requested ~~an~~ <sup>if</sup> ~~operation~~.

But the Doctor at the Hospital denied my request because they <sup>are</sup> ~~were~~ very busy <sup>at this time</sup> and my case ~~did not~~ was not absolutely necessary.

\* Always had a desire to have this done on me as a sign of the covenant as of old. Old in Abraham's days. (Gen 17) Finally, did this operation done in Camp Hully in 1943 by Capt. Joseph Kawasaka.

JANUARY 4

Monday, Oct. 27

19 Gave Pvt. Baldwin a couple of hours of code practice at our code table in the evening.

19 Catching up on my diary for the weekend.

Tuesday, Oct. 28

19 Up at 5:30 am. but rain prevented our "falling in" for Reville. The barracks seem empty now since the men have gone out on the problems.

Also two more barrack mates have been discharged <sup>Master</sup> and have become civilians again. They are Pvt.

19 Haruki Kondo and Cpl. Irie. Also among those leaving the Army yesterday were Master Sergeant James Pa, Pvt. Kawahilo, Pvt. Keichi Kimura, the artist and  ~~Sgt. Kame~~.

19 There was a heavy fog this am. near our area, but the rain was very light & stopped before noon.

During the "break" between classes, explained the Gospel to Pvt. Kiriyama. Also practically spent

- 19 The last transmitting practice period explaining Mormonism to Pvt. Rest of the 'Regulars'. His father was a Mormon & so were his grandfolks, but his mother was a Lutheran and so is he.
- 19 He had not investigated the teachings of Mormonism, and his father had not set him an ~~any~~ exemplary life nor had he been taught much pertaining the teachings of the father.
- 19 Day prophets. He questioned me regarding polygamy and other doctrines as taught to us and I was able to make him understand the truth of the revelation of Polygamy.
- 19 Will try to let him have some of the pamphlets and tracts on the Gospel tomorrow.

Am improving in receiving code at 12 w.p.m., but failed to pass the test of receiving code at this speed for 24 solid groups without error.

Listened to an interesting radio program, "Hawaii Town Hall of the Air" sponsored by the

Tuesday, Oct. 28 JANUARY 6

- 19 Honolulu Business College. The topic was on 'Juvenile Delinquency' and its problems. Tonight's speakers were <sup>Dr.</sup> Rev. Miles E. Cary, Capt. Roy Headman of the Police Dept. Miss Elsie Beltrush of the ~~the~~ Family Welfare Group and a Mr. Ferguson. This problem has grown by leaps and bounds within the last few years and the speakers touched upon some very important causes of this problem, especially the breaking up of the family as a unit. "A child is not born delinquent but is made so by his environment," which places much of the blame for this condition upon the adults. Next week these same speakers will endeavor to offer the remedies for this delinquency.

Wednesday, Oct. 29

- 19 Up ~~at~~ for Reveille at 6 am. Only a handful of men are left here in our company, the others will be coming back tomorrow. To radio school at 8 am until noon.

Wednesday, Oct. 29 ~~JANUARY 7~~

10 All men in camp were placed on <sup>the</sup> 50% list and fatigue duty in the afternoon until 3:30 pm cleaning up the area, pulling weeds & ~~then~~ mowing the <sup>lawn</sup> grass. Cpl. Pereira is planting some more

11 flowering plants at our "BQ" Co. corner. The men here will soon <sup>come to</sup> realize the wonderful service rendered us by Pvt. Tom Hirahara in landscaping and taking care of the plants in our area.

12 Spent the evening reading ~~some~~ religious material.

Found a copy of the Discourses of the Annual Conference <sup>(Apr 1941)</sup> in Salt Lake City of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints, to

13 Pvt. Root from the 75<sup>th</sup> Signal Division whose father was a Mormon, ~~but~~ <sup>is</sup> a Lutheran.

Thursday, Oct. 30

10 Up for Reveille at 6 am. To school from 8 am. to 4 pm with lunch break at noon at HNG Woods. I failed in the first test on electrical fundamentals (the passing mark is 85)

given us yesterday. Electrical fundamentals in the first test cover the electron theory + magnetism, field of forces, etc. I'll have to take the test over again soon. This is getting on to my ~~second~~ <sup>second full</sup> week in the 12 Wpm. class and I hope I might be able to concentrate enough to pass on to the 16 Wpm class soon.

Retreat at 5 pm. The men came back from the problem today at 3:30 pm, but only about a dozen of us fell in <sup>retreat</sup> formation today with Cpl. Matsumeda in charge.

Listened to the football broadcast at the Honolulu Stadium tonight. St. Louis and McKinley High School played a spectacular game with long runs by Art Jono, <sup>and</sup> Wedemeyer, <sup>and</sup> Kehumano, St. Louis finally showing the power and strength of a championship team by winning 20-0.

\* Wedemeyer is today one of the best open field runners in the U.S. for the last couple years. He was placed 4th in All American halfback in most of the All Star lists. He is finishing his last year at St. Mary's, Calif. (Page 47)

Friday, Oct. 31

JANUARY 1

19

Up at 5:30 am. for Reville. Cleaning up of the area, then to radio school. Took a test on 12 W.p.m. but don't know if I passed, although I was able to receive at one time during the test 31 solid groups of 5 letters, the minimum requirement being 24 solid groups. Was so nervous and ~~frayed~~ keyed up that I could hardly write the words. Also took <sup>after lunch</sup> again, the first test on electrical fundamentals. ~~off~~

19

Dropped in the Post Library to borrow a book, "Is that In the Bible". Class was dismissed today at 6 pm.

19

Understand the "Suicide squads" of the 1st Bn. simulated defending a position while the rest attacked them ~~at~~ in the mountains back of Kaawa. The wire section were out there, too, and they came back to camp at 4:30 pm., quite tired out from their strenuous work of the day.

<sup>19</sup> be sent in to Department Headquarters because I desired to go out to civilian life soon.

A few more promotions were officially noted <sup>in</sup> today's D.I.B. T/Sgt. Pereira was promoted <sup>19</sup> to M/Sgt., S/Sgt. Raymond Jellings to 1st Sgt. and Sgt. Coleman and Foo became S/Sgt.

A new Department order was read to us. All enlisted men under the rank of Sgt. <sup>19</sup> must be in the Schofield area before 1 pm. or be subject to disciplinary action. By this order to be effective from next Monday. Fifty per cent of the personnel also must be in <sup>19</sup> the area at all times. This weekend I am on that <sup>50%</sup> list.

<sup>19</sup> Went on the football ushering detail again today. Our 298<sup>th</sup> Team beat the 3<sup>rd</sup> Engineers after an exciting, spectacular game. The final score was, 298<sup>th</sup> 14, Engineers, 13. Pvt. Dias and Barboza from our HQ Co. <sup>both</sup> played a wonderful defensive game.

Sunday, Nov. 2.

~~JANUARY 19~~

19 Up at 7:00 am after a good night's sleep. The weather is getting rather milky in the mornings here, and we would rather stay cuddled up in our double blankets than get up.

19 Attended the 7:30 am. Catholic Mass at the New Hostess House out of curiosity and to try to understand the Catholic way of worship. The hall was well filled with soldiers in uniform, <sup>but</sup> with only two women and two children in attendance. Chaplain O'Brien of our 298<sup>th</sup> officiated, ~~although~~ <sup>but</sup> only a few of the men were from the 298<sup>th</sup>. Although I did not fully understand their way of worship, I felt a kindred spirit, and revered our Saviour Jesus Christ in my own heart. After the service I asked Father O'Brien to visit one of his "sheep", Pvt. Moniz from our HQ Co. who had been taken down to the Post Stockade for confinement, possibly to prevent him from AWOL from the quarters.

Sunday, Nov. 2

~~JANUARY 19~~

19 What impressed me most at the services was the humility of those receiving communion; and although the priest conducted all the rites with the help of an altar boy, each man <sup>after</sup> receiving communion knelt down and said his silent prayers. It seems they partake of these sacred emblems with much more reverence than many of us in our <sup>own</sup> sacrament service.

19 We must impress upon our members, especially the younger children, of the sacredness of this ordinance.

Spent the afternoon reading and studying.

19 Wrote a long letter to Takeo telling him the story of Alma's conversion to the faith as written in the Book of Mormon, Alma 36.

19 Monday, Nov. 3

Up at 5:45 am. for Reville. Reported to the Station Hospital for my <sup>operation</sup> ~~treatment~~ but was told to report back.

19 Next week Wednesday.

Received my pay today of \$56<sup>00</sup> minus laundry expense, donation to the welfare fund, and other miscellaneous expenses of about \$5<sup>00</sup>. Those who owe me money returned the loans <sup>to them</sup> ~~although~~. I do not keep a record of ~~the~~ the<sup>se</sup> loans.

The afternoon was devoted to rifle marksmanship making triangles on paper with the sighting bar. Cpl. S. Pereira also reviewed the men on stripping and putting together the M.1 rifle. Every man in our company will be required to fire the rifle during the next week.

Spent some time in the evening explaining the Gospel to Pvt. Hiratani.

19 Read the library book, "Is that in the Bible" by Charles Francis Potter and find in it many interesting topics. The section devoted pertaining to sex uncovers many instances.

Monday, Nov. 3

of immorality by even the prophets of old. They really opened my eyes to the whoredom of old because I had not read the Bible much as yet.

Tuesday, Nov. 4.

Up for Reville at 6 am.

Received our new tropical dress hat (light weight tan 'elephant' hat) which will make us look like Frank Buck hunting wild game. It is quite a nifty affair.

Heard Pvt. Carvallo had returned to camp this am. He had been AWOL for about a month or so. What punishment he will receive we do not know yet but he is sure to spend much time in the Post Stockade.

Here is another case of one young man never having learned the first principle of being a good soldier; discipline or learning to obey & carry out orders willingly.

cal fundamental test #1 with a high  
mark (this being the second time I had  
19 taken this test for I had failed to pass the  
first time). Barely passed the third proce-  
sure test with a mark of 88%.

19 discharge from active service because there was an error in typing in the ones I signed last Saturday.

Retreat on the company street at 5 pm.

19 This retreat formation is a regimental order although the Hawaii Dept. has ordered men to be released from duty at 4 pm. to give us more time because of the 1 am. curfew ruling.

19 Listened tonight to the Hawaii "Town Hall of the Air" with Dr. Miles Cary, Dr. Long of the U. of H., Capt Ray Madison, and Mr. Dwight Ferguson discussing general remedies for

19 the problems of "juvenile Delinquency." It seems to me that no concrete, constructive, and immediate remedy was offered by any of the speakers tonight. I believe if the

19 public school system was revamped, especially in the lower, elementary grades to teach and stress moral training along the lines of the Japanese Language schools with

- 19 adult education through their Parent-Teacher  
Assoc. and the establishing of <sup>small</sup> community  
centers in all parts of the city, this  
problem of juvenile delinquency will be

19 running around I had done in a long while and I really enjoyed it because this helps to work up an appetite and makes the food taste much better.

19 Went down to ~~the~~ Post Theatre # 3 in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Engineers' area to see a rollicking, comical picture of married life, "The awful truth". Cary Grant and Irene Dunne played the leading

19 roles. It was a very funny picture but the very sacredness of marriage was made light of, which is far too prevailing in this generation today. Pvt. Edward <sup>Heller</sup> parts of

19 Wakawa was my companion tonight and he, being a married man, we spent some time after the show discussing many topics relating to married life.

Up at 5:30 am but no Reville formation again. Down to the radio school at 8 am.

- 19 Am able to receive only about a half dozen <sup>solid</sup> code groups at a time at 16 wpm and over. Will need a lot more practice but I ~~do~~ think I may be <sup>relieved</sup> ~~released~~ from attending this school if my <sup>Army</sup> discharge papers are approved by the War Dept. It is indeed a privilege to go to this radio school and learn to receive code. It is only through continuous, tedious practice that code can be mastered.

19 Back from school at 4 pm. and <sup>B.</sup> retreat at 5 pm.

19 Had a little extra transmitting practice at night at our regimental code room.

19 Reading tonight, but my eyes seem to bother me so am retiring early.

Friday, Nov. 7

No reveille this morning. Because the regiment is leaving early for the firing

Saturday, Nov. 8

19 Up at 4:45 am to prepare to go to the Post Range with the telephone detail under Sgt. Tander. Was telephone orderly in the 200 yd. pit for Lt. Shaw who supervised the work in the pit. Firing was over early and all returned back to camp before lunch.

19 Drove into Honolulu on \*Brother Amoy's ~~car~~ car, who took me way up to our home.

19 Helped water the lawn in the afternoon then headed for the L.D.S. circus on the Mission grounds opposite Sears. Enjoyed meeting the brethren and sisters at their work in the soda water concession and balloon booth, selling tickets, etc. Met Bro. Smith from Wickham Field and we saw a couple of shows together. The main show was crowded and every seat was taken for the performances, which included, the Ozarkis and Kaito troupes in their balancing, juggling, and tight wire acts; Trained seals and baboons, <sup>daring</sup> High Trapeze acts, and the indispensable clowns.

Ate a very delicious lunch of breaded veal, custard pie, etc., in the main mess hall. I had heard of emaciated men not

<sup>19</sup> wanting to come to the hospital because they were practically starved with the liquid diet they were given but that is not the case with us healthy men for I

<sup>19</sup> saw many patients go for second servings. Nothing to do but "chew the fat" and read. I won't be able to do much reading <sup>for a while</sup> after the operation.

<sup>19</sup> My left eyelashes were trimmed tonight and some kind of medicine squirted into it. Then it was ~~to~~ covered up.

The doctor also gave me a routine <sup>19</sup> examination for blood pressure, tonsils, ear, eyes, "short arm" and anal.

Lights out at 9 pm. and off to bed.

19 I purely miss my reading but spend <sup>the</sup> part of time listening to my neighbor's bed radiophone.

Wednesday, Nov. 19

19 Was awake long before the first bugle call of the 19<sup>th</sup> Infantry. Rested all day in bed with an icebag over my eyes.

19 Went over to the laboratory in the morning for a Wassermann blood test. Then back to bed. Only feel a slight inconvenience with the patch over the left eye. Will not try to strain my eyes by reading today for there will be 19 plenty of time for that.

Enjoyed eating a nice big lunch of meat loaf, mashed potatoes, string beans, asparagus, milk <sup>ice cream,</sup> juncupple juices, and vegetable salad. The food

Wednesday, Nov. 19

19 here is much better than our company mess. This meal was served to me in bed but I was no sick man for I ate practically all that was on the tray.

19 My neighbor, John Evans, is moving to Ward 26 upstairs and he was kind enough to let me have his radiophone, which will be a great help because I will not be able to do much reading.

19 Brother Wright spent much time with me again today and we enjoyed telling each other of our experiences as members of the Church and how the Gospel teachings have strengthened us from temptations while in the Army. Surely, we have much to be thankful for. Brother Wright might be discharged from the hospital tomorrow and sent back to his outfit, the 804 Engineers.

All the patients here are kind and considerate of each other, helping to clean the beds of those unable to do so, <sup>refilling</sup> changing the ice bag, and

19 Doing many other things that make our stay here a pleasant memory.

Listened to the Schofield fights over the hospital radio system until 9 pm.

19 I find it rather hard to sleep ~~steadily~~ soundly at night because I had slept too much during the day time.

19 Thursday, Nov. 20, 1941 "Thanksgiving Day"

Yes, indeed, this is a day of thanksgiving to our Heavenly Father for I have much to be thankful for. Although I am here in the hospital, I am enjoying my stay here and except for my eye, I am physically alright. We do not <sup>fully</sup> appreciate what it means to be in good health until we become sick and incapacitated. We should offer thanks to our Heavenly Father for the good health that we enjoy and pray for those who are less fortunate than we are.

Thursday, Nov. 20

19 "Thanksgiving Day" is a big day in the Army with tons and tons of turkey (101 tons in the Hawaiian Dept.) and the other foods that go to make this a big feast day. This day, like all

19 holidays, is losing its original religious significance and becoming more a day of happy and glorious feasting. Be that as it may, we at the hospital crowded into the decorated mess hall

19 900 strong, eating in ~~the~~ turn a large freefall of Thanksgiving Day food. There were large chunks of well roasted, delicious turkey, Virginia Baked Ham, buttered corn on the cob, Walnut

Pvt. Burke, especially, has nightmares quite often. I told him that I, too, used to be troubled with them, but since I had learned to say my

Spent the morning hours reading the "Book of Mormon" and other religious material.

Left many "tracts" at the reading desk,

- 19 hoping that someone might be touched by the truths contained within them. It is the practice of the chaplains on duty at the hospital to pass out to the individual patients here "tracts" on the Gospel of Jesus Christ as taught by them. Not many soldiers read the "tracts" or even care to speak on the subject of religion.

Dr. Pinkerton approved of my release from

"Police" as we used to call him; at "Prom Town" was a practicing physician who was drafted. He is the brother of Mr. Pinkerton, head of the Medical Corps in Honolulu. (Page 47)

The citizens and general mass of people of the U.S. and Japan are still cool-headed, and there need be 19 no trouble if the leaders of both nations would humble themselves and not let their false pride guide their further actions.

Why I didn't record the following when it happened, I don't know, but the events ~~are~~<sup>is</sup> burned into my memory as if it happened only yesterday instead of a good ~~five~~<sup>six</sup> years ago.

On my way home on the Rapid Transit bus after visiting the mortuary, I deliberately got off at Kapiolani Blvd near Sheridan<sup>st</sup> because I did not know what to do about my coming discharge on Dec. 8, 1941 and I needed to be alone to meditate. Though not knowing <sup>actually</sup> why, I ~~did not feel~~<sup>felt that</sup> that I should <sup>just</sup> accept the discharge (~~and~~ I refused to take the first one on Nov. 14<sup>th</sup>). Puzzled and confused, I walked up and down Kapiolani Blvd mulling these things over in my mind, asking God, also, to help me ~~make~~ make a decision. (I had already signed my discharge papers <sup>today Dec. 6</sup> and the Hq. Clerk, Pfc W. Lums, had told me to come back Monday to pick it up after ~~the~~ Col. Anderson signed it.)

One thing very noticeable to us trainees from Reception Center is the lack of military discipline amongst the 298<sup>th</sup> for we had very strict training by regular Army men <sup>in Brown Army</sup>. Here, the officers & men seem more like one big family with its usual squabbles of minor nature.

- 19 "Did 'G'-man duty out on the field during the morning & spent the afternoon cleaning our radio equipment for inspection tomorrow. Non-coms reviewed their field lessons for their communication tests Monday.

- 19 First Sergeant Bussy offered me the Tugler's job but I told him I preferred staying in my present place because I felt I could learn more in this section & my request was <sup>like</sup> OK'd by Lieut. Ballinger who was my classmate in Filimokalan's School in Honduras.  
Spent considerable time cleaning my web equipment & rifle for inspection.

MARCH 22

Saturday

19 Up early, & trying to get set for our first full field inspection at HNG Woods. Marched out to the parade ground at 8 am and pitched tent on the still, dewy <sup>grass</sup> ground.

19 Colonel Anderson was well pleased with the display. We from the Reception Center expected a much stricter inspection of our rifles so we were very much relieved after the inspection. Even then it was nearly 10:30 am before we struck tents again.

Left camp for home at 3:00 pm after checking that everything was O.K. Washed my 19 dirty underwear which we could not send ~~to~~ out to the Laundry due to our change to the 298th Infantry.

19 Attended Priesthood Conference at Kelchi, <sup>M.O.</sup> where Bishop Ashton of Salt Lake City explained the pictures slides he showed us of the Welfare work & of the great grain elevator where wheat is being stored for our future use. Pres. Murphy of Lake Temple showed some beautiful colored slides of flowers & scenery.

MARCH 23

Up at 8 am. & got ready for Sunday School. Made sure we would reach there early because Bishop Ashton ~~would~~ <sup>would</sup> speak to us.

meha Highway just past Kahuku. We installed a plane for Lt. Col. Porter who was in charge of the 1<sup>st</sup> BN. C.P. on Kam-  
Highway while the 2<sup>nd</sup> BN were on our right moving across there  
the same field. We were attacking the 299<sup>th</sup> Inf., reinforced  
by the 2<sup>nd</sup>, 19<sup>th</sup> <sup>Inf.</sup> ~~Inf.~~ their reserves who had a position on  
the other side of Water Tank Hill. We waited for the different  
units to get into their respective attacking position and after laying  
our lines & setting up the radio communication back to the  
regimental C.P. at camp & other C.P. & O.P., we stood by while  
the infantrymen went thru their simulated attack. In order  
to break the deadlock between the two forces at 10:30 am, the  
35<sup>th</sup> Inf. reserves were called to reinforce us & we succeeded  
in driving back the defenses from their position at 11:00 am.  
Ordered to move forward at this time so advanced

19<sup>th</sup> "Overhanging Rock." Recalled to camp at 12 noon & ate our field rations & a light lunch. In the afternoon came the hard work of setting in the lines we had laid out in the morning. When our work was finished we went swimming & enjoyed frolicking in the cool ocean. The problem was to wash off the salty water afterwards because there was no shower but we managed it with rinsing with our canteen water.

19<sup>th</sup> Pt. <sup>Miller</sup> Makaha visited our tent in the evening & Brother Kanete & I who is a Mormon Elder and ~~regularly~~ explained the gospel of Jesus Christ & Mormonism to him & I pray & hope that the seeds we had sown here fall upon fertile souls about us that they might grow in spiritual stature & come to accept the truth.

Wednesday, April 16.

19<sup>th</sup> The 28<sup>th</sup> are being held in reserve for the 35<sup>th</sup> Inf. who are continuing the attack. We spent the ~~party~~ morning in learning to work up the different methods of telephone installation & other general instructions.

- 19 on communication work. Spent the afternoon reading & later swimming. This seems more like a picnic than a maneuver for we spent the afternoon enjoying ourselves, some ~~men~~ fishing, others playing softball, volleyball, touch football & chasing the calves that kept wandering near our bivouac. There was much drinking & singing at night under the bright <sup>moon</sup> light & the PX truck that came loaded with beer & soda water was soon emptied by the thirsty soldiers. Some were so "lit" up that I wonder if they could carry on their duties if a call to move out tonight came.

Understand we will be up at 2:30 am. Tomorrow & be ready to move out at 5 am. so went to bed early. We heard the defense has retreated to the vicinity of Waialea School & our objective tomorrow is Sengfield.

Twice in Reception Center I was on guard duty but each time I had an army job, first <sup>19</sup> as acting corporal of the guards, then orderly the second time.

Col. Stephen Vasirna + a ~~Chinese~~ Korean Sergeant of "A" Co. had a fight over it one day. "Steve" objected to the flowers being swept up to the Sgt. about 47 ft. (9 ft. 47)

MAY 1918

Wednesday, May 14

19 Diamond Head looks like a miniature mountain beside the other ranges. We strung the 1<sup>st</sup> Bn lines to the 35<sup>th</sup> Inf. switchboard, then pitched our tents among the pine trees. Ate a late supper with "B" Co. men at 7:30 pm. because their truck followed the wrong <sup>way</sup> convoy & ~~also~~ <sup>was</sup> ~~tracked~~.

19 It is very windy and cold on top of Pua Koa mountain but where we were, under the pine trees, it was quite warm. Went to bed at 8 pm listening to the wind blowing thru the pine trees.

19 May 15, Thursday

~~Today~~ <sup>Today</sup> is my birthday, making me 30 years old. I would never have dreamed of spending any of my birthdays in such a surrounding as this, but here I am, <sup>at 30 years old,</sup> feeling like a Boy Scout on an outing.

19 Up at 6:00 am & breakfasted immediately. Then changed immediately into fatigues to get ready to go to work. The rest of the regiment was digging ~~under~~ <sup>under</sup> gun emplacements in strategic positions and widening the <sup>curves in the</sup> dangerous trails nearby. "G" & "H" Co. bivouaced near Mutual <sup>Relief</sup> Telephone Station, "C" & "F" bivouaced at Hancock Park & "A" Co. on the Honolulu Trails.

Our ~~post~~ <sup>post</sup> communication section rode on convoys on a

MAY 29

<sup>19</sup> reconnaissance all morning to the 2<sup>nd</sup> BN area & to Kanakuli Park, & putting in one phone at Kanakuli Park. Back at Pua Maunaloa camp just in time for lunch.

Then at 1 pm. headed towards serpentine Mauna Kape. <sup>19</sup> trail for "B" Co. bivouac; passed 35<sup>th</sup> Inf. men widening the dangerous curves; "A" Co. also ~~was~~ ~~was~~ ~~was~~ doing pick & shovel work on the ~~trail~~ <sup>trail</sup> 6 or 7 mi. from our campsite. We installed a phone at "A" Co. kitchen & started unreeeling wire.

<sup>19</sup> on the way home. This was a slow, tortuous job up & down the serpentine curves. We ran out of wire about 2 mi. from our campsite. Reached camp after 5 pm & reported the lack of wire to Lt. Sgt. Brown of the 35<sup>th</sup> who went out after supper with

<sup>19</sup> his men to finish the job. After wiping the dust & grime off our faces & body (there is no place to take a bath here) we enjoyed supper then went to bed early, being quite tired out.

Scattered seeds of Mormonism about me during the day.

Friday May 16. — Up at 6:00 am., 1st Bn. communication section

MAY 25

- 19 under Hq. Kinnick left camp at 6:30 am. to check the line laid yesterday to "A" Co. Started from the "A" Co. kitchen & found 2 breaks in the line near their camp on the Honolulu trail caused by an Army truck. Then about midway between camps, found a short circuit. After repairing
- 19 the line & checking all OK, we turned around to go back towards Honolulu trail at 10:30 am. While making our way back, our truck, driven by Pfc. Raymond Day ("the airplane driver") had a wheel slip & ran off the road & left us stranded with only half of the truck on the road. The 12 men, including the driver, tried to lift it back onto the road but it would not budge, so we had to send for help to the regimental CP. by tapping in on the line. At 1:00 pm, 2 trucks from Service Co. with H. Keliinui in charge & Sgt. Francis of the Dispensary came to
- 19 help us out but by towing the truck backward only caused it to slide & tilt more. So H. Keliinui went back for some blocks & tackle & other equipment. Having had no lunch, we opened a can of pork & beans we had & made sandwiches with the 2 loaves of bread.
- 19 Water & united but no sign of the truck. A lift of the road with detail of the 35<sup>th</sup> Inf. happened by at 2:30 pm. & seeing our position called over his men to ~~work~~ work & dig under the truck. Then his tough men lifted it onto the road where we worked at their strength

MAY 28

Friday, May 16

19 We thanked them + off we went for Hanalei public park for a swim. at about 6:15 pm. Then enjoyed our first trail at the Waianae Military Reservation shower room. Back to Hanalei for a light show at 7 Co mess; then headed for <sup>Camp</sup> ~~Hotel~~ at 8:30 pm. Reached camp just 19 in time for supper at 6:30 pm. Received good news that we would have the weekend off. Philip Lee is traveling with me tonight instead of Clifford Ch.

19 Saturday, May 17

After breakfast, Pfc. Caldera + myself went with the 35<sup>th</sup> Inf to lay 2 lines from <sup>the</sup> gun emplacement any part the Mutual Radio Telephone Station to the airfield at Puu Hanalei. This was some 19 job because we had to take the lines upon our shoulders thru the cotton + lantern bushes pulling the lines up + down the mountainous section. And I had <sup>lost</sup> Stralbin's Tool kit + pieces on top of that which must have broken the strap + dropped from my belt near the end of 19 the lines. Practically crawled back to camp after the strenuous work. Rested then had lunch.

At 12:30, formed in line to get on the convoys which took us back to Schofield ANGO woods where the men reached thru their showers

\* "Pro" of our 298<sup>th</sup> brought me home to HNG Woods on the coupe & ~~collected~~ on the trip met Brother Frank Cockett of the 299<sup>th</sup> who happened to be on the car, too.

Sunday, May 18

Dressed to attend the morning service at the New Haven House ~~but~~ there was none this Sunday because of the renovation. Dropped in Reception Center to visit my friends Jimmie & Helen but they had gone to Honolulu for the weekend.

Back in HNG Woods by 10:30 pm. am. to study <sup>Pro</sup> in the Book of Mormon.

Am fasting today for 2 weeks. For lunch the <sup>best</sup> ~~best~~ has turkey but I would rather miss that and pray & fast for the great gains in my heart.

MAY 23

Sunday, May 18

The men who had gone home for the weekend began returning to HNG Woods for they had been warned that any one missing the convoy back to camp Pua Manuakawa would be severely dealt with.

Convoy formed at 3:30 pm. & left HNG Woods at 4:00 pm. Reached Pua Manuakawa after 5:00 pm then had supper immediately afterwards. Listened to some fine opera music and a religious program by the "Practical Men of Religion" on Pfc. Lee's portable radio. Was delighted to hear the song "God Be With You Till We Meet Again" over the radio. Sent a letter to Min Himee Urakaki to help her become an I.O.S.

Monday, May 19

Up at 5:30 am. After breakfast our section went to help the 35<sup>th</sup> Inf. string up a line to the gun emplacement from their C.P. and also to ~~change~~<sup>move</sup> some lines away to a new position away from the new road ~~away~~ past the Radio Telephone station. Back in camp for lunch, then off to Kenaakuli Beach for a swim & shower afterwards at the Waianae

Monday, May 19 MAY #1

19 Recreation at 4:00 pm. Back in camp for ~~small~~ supper.

Just before supper, I read a touching true story in the August, 1946 copy of Dorothy Lamour's letter, "Dear Gene"  
19 "Yes But She Can't Find Love." To find such a beautiful outline made for love yet not being able to find true love! how unfortunate that she has not the beautiful teachings we possess!

19 Sgt. Leblond ~~found~~ found the tool kit I had lost the other day on the trail while helping the 35<sup>th</sup> string their lines.

Tuesday, May 20

Up at 5:30 am then breakfasted. Loaded up our excess communication equipment on our trucks & took them  
19 back to the HNG Woods. Had a nice warm shower bath before coming back to Pine Manuwhewea. Rested a while then had lunch. The rest of the ~~infantry~~ regiment are still doing their pick & shovel work.

19 After lunch the men left on the canvas to go swimming but I stayed back because the urge to write to Miss Dorothy Lamour was very strong. If my humble letter ~~could~~ <sup>could</sup> lead her to look into Mormonism, my joy would know

I finally received that I referred her to the life of Francis. May an SOS and a...

JUNE 1

Tuesday, May 20

19 <sup>lands</sup> ~~no~~ <sup>no</sup> ~~no~~. How to mail my letter so it will reach her before her scheduled sailing for Honolulu is the problem. To-day's Advertiser states she is returning <sup>here</sup> for a complete rest. (P.S.) but it is air mail Wednesday)\*

19 Tonight is the <sup>Territory</sup> ~~sub-~~ <sup>side</sup> Blackout exercise. In anticipation of an interesting sight, the men all gathered together early, <sup>(8:00 pm)</sup> ~~at~~ vantage points to watch it, many groups spending their waiting period in song & joking "chewing their fat." The anti-tank

19 section of HQ Co. had set up two of their <sup>powerful</sup> French telescopes up with which they tried to identify different buildings, <sup>of Honolulu</sup> by their light signs. The Advertiser tower & the Variety theatre signs were easily spotted by this means.

19 From our campsite the beautiful <sup>display</sup> ~~array~~ of lights is a pretty sight with the lights of Waipahu and Kea in the foreground and the ~~big~~ lights of the many battleships in Pearl Harbor, then Hickam Field, and finally the dim, milky way of Honolulu itself. When the Blackout signal came <sup>9:15 pm</sup> (which we followed on Pfc. Lee's radio) the Waipahu & Kea lights were out immediately, then ~~we~~, Honolulu and last to blot its lights & leave us in pure darkness was the Hickam Field light system. For a short

JUNE 2

- 19 while a few lights failed to go out, one on our left, and a couple in the outskirts of the city. Loaded up our equipment on our trucks then left in the 1<sup>st</sup> convoy at 7:00 <sup>am.</sup> for HNG Woods. Our job at Pine Manuakua has been completed <sup>but</sup>
- 19 the maneuver is still on until the 24<sup>th</sup> during which time we may get a call to move out at any time of the day or night.

We are again on <sup>the</sup> reserve train, ready for any alert call.

JUNE-3

Wednesday, May 21

19 Rumors are that we might move out tonight so loaded up our equipment and posted guards about them from 6:00 pm. Started sentry duty from 6:30 pm. to 8:30 pm on post #3 of Headquarters area. After being relieved of my post I tried to sleep with

19 my boots & leggings on but they were very uncomfortable to sleep in. The movement during the night, <sup>we took them off later.</sup> Blackout here after 7:00 pm.

Thursday, May 22

19 Up with the luffs at 6:00 am. already dressed except for shoes & leggings. Still breakfasting with "B" Co. mess. Then out cleaning up of our area.

We were called out to "fall in" at 8:45 am to get ready to go out towards ~~the~~ <sup>the</sup> ~~area~~ where the "enemy" has landed that night & were engaged by the regulars, 35<sup>th</sup> <sup>Infantry</sup> & others.

19 On the way down our convoy was ~~loaded~~ <sup>(to)</sup> machine-gunned by enemy aircraft, which swooped down in pairs, <sup>up at a time</sup> over our heads, and since we were moving during broad daylight, I believe we were mostly casualties. Reached a wooded area near a banana plantation off Waialua Highway and headed towards the <sup>foot of the</sup> mountains near Makulua under cover of the

Thursday, May 27

JUNE 4

19 <sup>high</sup> <sup>also the base</sup> all trees lining up the side of the road & ~~the high base~~  
Relieved the tired regulars of the 35<sup>th</sup>, capturing immediately  
quite a number of the "enemy" and driving them back further.  
Our men were without lunch, but, nevertheless, pushed ahead.

19 Then the combined C.P. was established & as business under  
the plum trees & amongst the brush & alfalfa at dusk.  
The 1<sup>st</sup> BN ~~communication~~ section had <sup>set</sup> up the ER-131 with  
the Taylor antenna, but we did not have to lay any wire out.

19 The 27<sup>th</sup> Inf.'s rolling kitchen fed their men about 9:15 pm.  
while we stood by, "watering in our mouths". When their officers  
found out that we had had no food since breakfast they very  
graciously offered <sup>all</sup> the remains of their supper to the hungry

19 and weary 298<sup>th</sup> and we <sup>pressed</sup> ~~pressed~~ upon the food, and boy!  
the food surely tasted good.

19 ~~Left~~ Broke camp soon afterwards, heading for <sup>the</sup> HNO block  
which we reached about 10:30 pm. & were called to supper.

19 I made <sup>a couple</sup> ~~some~~ sandwiches from the <sup>meat</sup> turkey & hamburger  
for an emergency tomorrow.

19 After enjoying a nice warm bath, dropped off to sleep with me  
<sup>in</sup> for a cotrap, expecting an alert anytime.

JUNE-5

Friday, May 23

- 19 Sure enough, we were pulled out of bed at 1:00 pm to head for Waimea Bay area where the anti-tanks had already gone. Reached Pupukea camp about 2:30 am, but did not pitch camp because we were now to push out. Breakfasted at 4:30<sup>am</sup> at the field and left the area at 5:00 am for Kahuku along the mountainous foot trails. The enemy, which had landed yesterday, had already reached the mountains & it was our mission to drive them out. While we were up here, <sup>and enjoying a clear view of the countryside</sup> we spotted a convoy of 13 enemy trucks in the Kawaiipape area & reported that fact to the 15<sup>th</sup> Field Artillery who were there on our flanks. An "enemy" force of <sup>and a mule</sup> ~~rid~~ men with Klaxon horns representing machine gunfire, each man representing a <sup>platoon</sup> ~~tattalion~~, <sup>kept us</sup> back so we chased them from one <sup>defensive</sup> position to another along the narrow single trails. Our communication section carried along our SCR 131 radio equipment, & a few Teat phones, etc. We were on the march up & down the mountainous <sup>Pupukea</sup> trail from 19:5 am until 11:00 pm. ~~landed~~ carrying the heavy equipment on our backs. We had driven the enemy out of the mountains and stopped at Kahuku <sup>the</sup> ~~store~~ <sup>our meeting point</sup>, waiting for our convoy to pick us up. Again we had not eaten lunch & ~~slipped~~ as the

JUNE-6

Friday, May 23

19 men were starving. They "raided" the store for any edibles, many not being honest enough to pay for their food & drinks. The storekeeper, I think, never catered to so many at ~~any~~ <sup>one</sup> time before because when the hungry <sup>of the whole regiment</sup> ~~had~~ <sup>had</sup> gone thru this store, they left it practically empty ~~to~~ <sup>for</sup> the locusts but in the picture, "Brigham Young."

Our convoy picked us up at 8:30 pm. but we did not reach the division review field, Echo Pk, our destination, until way past 11:00 pm. because we used the shuttle system. From there we <sup>marched</sup> ~~walked~~ up to the South range where we rested under blackout conditions. We could not enter our area except for the latrine because the barracks were restricted area. We supper in the dark on the range at 12:15 ~~midnite~~ and was about to fall asleep when we were called up on alert at 1:30 am. Saturday.

Saturday, May 24

Packed away our Hampets in our barrack bags

JUNE 7

Saturday, May 24

19 and left them there on the Range. Carrying our heavy equipment on our shoulders we headed in a column of twos towards Kolakole pass. Our section was under Sgt. Silva because 1st Lt. Karvatta did

19 not come with us. Marching in the dark up and over the pass toward Waianae. After establishing our C.P. after relieving the tired 35<sup>th</sup> & 27<sup>th</sup> regulars at 7:30 am. we started out from our line of departure

19 towards the "enemy" who had landed on the beach at the Waianai land site. I went out with Cpl. Glendon & Kong with the Lt. Kapea as commander of Co. B & A of the <sup>defending</sup> ~~attacking~~ force. We worked the "Wacky-talky" until Recall sounded at 8:30 am. We were <sup>awakened</sup> ~~scattered~~ quite a bit by the sharp Kukui trunk that we had to go through.

After recall sounded we were told to wait <sup>because</sup> ~~until~~ the

19 trucks were being sent to pick us up. They finally did <sup>so</sup> at 11:30 pm. while we roasted in the hot and dusty Waianae. Reached HNB Woods just in time for late lunch. Tired and dusty though I was, not



JUNE 9

Sunday, May 25

<sup>19</sup> Gave some reading material on our Church to Pfc. Bagley and Pfc. Piganelli.

Studied my Book of Mormon "Alma"

After a short rest, went back on the switchboard detail from 4 pm. until 8 pm. But my relief has not come back from town so am doing extra duty until 10:30 pm.

Monday, May 26

<sup>19</sup> Rveille at 6:00 am., breakfast, then cleaning of "B" Branches. From 7:30 am. for one hour, HQ Co. has close order drill which was sorely needed. For the rest of this month, the ~~train~~ work day is 7:30 am. to

<sup>19</sup> 11:30 am., afternoons off, but restricted to the area.

Went on my new shift on the board from 8 am. to 12 noon. Very fast shift but I can easily handle it.

<sup>19</sup> In the afternoon, spent my time cleaning all my dirty web & pack equipment, & cleaning my rifle after the maneuver.

Reading "Alma" in the Book of Mormon.

Tuesday, May 27.

JUNE 10

19 Up for Reveille at 6 am. <sup>then</sup> cleaning up of our area. After breakfast, fed close order drill from 7:30 am until 8 am. On the 'Board from 8 to 12 noon.

19 Joined in a game of softball for a short while. Then cleaned up "H.D." field of all debris & rubbish.

<sup>of the form</sup> Listened to President Roosevelt's fire side chat in which he declared the stand of this nation he represents. He said, "We will do all in our power to preserve this nation ~~to preserve~~ that we might retain our freedom of speech, freedom of press, and freedom of religious worship." <sup>19</sup> \*The President issued a proclamation that this is <sup>an</sup> ~~an~~ <sup>unlimited</sup> national emergency. This might mean that our service in the army might be for a longer term than we expected. The men <sup>19</sup> ~~do~~ have no hatred towards our opponents and though those on the outside express great fear of the future, we are calm and cool, hoping & praying that the time will <sup>never</sup> come when we need kill.

morning chores, I went on my pintboard detail at 8 am until 12 noon.

At 1:00 pm "HQ" Co. "fell in" to have our pictures taken. This picture will appear soon in the Army page of the newspaper (Star-Bulletin)

Went down with the ball team to the 35<sup>th</sup> field to watch our team play a practice game with the 3<sup>rd</sup> Engineers who beat us <sup>by the score of</sup> 9-5.

Pfc. Cody had come to visit us at HNB Woods when I had gone to the ball game. He ~~wish~~ desires that I call him up at 11 pm tomorrow night.

The regiment was ordered to be ready to ~~move out~~ at 4:30 pm. The communication section of the HQ Co. and some of the 1<sup>st</sup> BN did move out at 5:30 pm for Koolau Range & Waianua Reservoir. We string lines out there for the various ~~posts~~ guarding the reservoir. Some of the most beautiful and peaceful scenery <sup>can be seen</sup> ~~is~~ of them.

19

Installed temporary phones there then reached "home" at 11 pm. To have out <sup>little</sup> supper; off to tea to rest until tomorrow morning when we will go back to finish our job.

Friday, May 30

~~JUNE 19~~

19 Today is Memorial Day for the rest of the world but for us here at <sup>the</sup> HNB Wood this day is no holiday. We have been called to be on the alert and no one has been allowed to leave the post area for Honolulu from 4:30 p.m. yesterday.

19 After breakfast, the 1<sup>st</sup> Bn communication section under Sgt. Caseras left for the East jump to finish our job of last night. We finally found an <sup>permanent</sup> open line to Scripps Tactical at the East Range and from there we strung our line to the Bb 71 at the medic tent at the East ~~Jump~~ Dam near Mr. Deane's home. Left Pfc. Strohlin there to break in the guards to operate the Bb. and came back in time for supper.

19 All those on sentry duty <sup>at installations</sup> have been issued real ammunition with their rifles & pistols loaded & locked and they have been told by the Colonel to shoot if necessary. I was given one clip of those ammunition while putting up our phones but returned them when the work was completed. Pfc. Coey wishes to attend Sunday School this weekend.

~~Monday~~  
19 and asked me to call him up at noon tomorrow to make arrangements for it. I must not forget to invite Pvt W<sup>m</sup> Eking to attend, too.

19 Was latrine orderly this morning. Received my extra pay <sup>(32)</sup> for my rating as a 6<sup>th</sup> class specialist. Fortunately for me, I was permitted to leave camp for the weekend.

19 On my way home, dropped in the Poststore at the Kaliki Chapel to buy 6 Books of Mormon. Went to the Army & Navy "Y" to meet Pfc. Cody who brought along his friend, <sup>Pfc.</sup> Rhodes. We headed for the New Sears & Roebuck Store where Rhodes brought some photographic records.

a blackout tonight at 9:00 pm. for a 1/2 hour

Fourteen members of the communication  
section, including 1 Pfc. Mandula, moved out to  
the military reservation at Pokai Bay where the

19 298<sup>th</sup> will fire <sup>machine guns</sup> on water-borne targets. We  
checked our lines & communication in the  
morning and ~~later~~ established a satchboard  
at the camp. By noon the place reminded me

OCTOBER 4

19 Tuesday, Aug. 19: <sup>Pyramids</sup>  
of Boom Town after all the large tents were  
put up and wooden cots put in.

19 The firing started after 1 pm and I was  
assigned as telephone orderly at the South Barrier.

19 Firing continued until 5 pm. because of a delay  
caused by the target overturning once. My duty  
consisted in reporting any approaching vessel  
to the control tower where the position was plotted  
19 and if in the danger <sup>zone</sup>, the craft was warned  
and firing stopped.

19 Later in the evening, many of the men camped  
here dressed up in their uniform and visited the small  
town of Waianae. The storekeepers were surely  
surprised to see so many Japanese American soldiers  
at one time. There is not much to see in Waianae.

19 But the men spent some time walking up and down  
the streets, and as typical soldiers, trying to talk  
to every female who would allow them to do so.  
Back to bed after 11 pm, sleeping with our tent sides  
up and breathing in the cool ocean breeze.

OCTOBER 5

Wednesday, Aug. 20

19 \* Pvt. Harushi Kondo, who had been begging me to remember him in my diary, sleeps next to me in our tent. He pitches for our Regimental baseball team in the Sheffield League and does a creditable job of it, too.

19 With a fancy leg stroke like a ballet dancer's.

Others bunking in this tent are Pvt. Kopp, Yoshimoto, Day, Pfc. Ok and Lee and Cpl. Matsuda.

Up at 4 am. This morning, breakfasted and

19 off to our various positions and on the tugboats with our walky-talkies & telephones. Stayed on the observation post at the South Barrier until 12:30 pm when firing was over for the day.

19 Enjoyed swimming for a couple of hours in the afternoon. I must say the beach here at Pukai Bay is very good with plenty of sandy area.

Watched Lt. Keolaha ~~instruct~~ coach part of

19 the 130 lb. football team here in camp in the afternoon.

Wrote a long letter to Sister Valgardson telling her of the dedication of the L.D.S. Tabernacle.

Enjoyed a free movie in camp shown by Cpl. Refeltt of our HQ Co. under the direction of the Morale Officer.

Wednesday, Aug 20 OCTOBER - 6

19 I notice a growing desire on the part of the enlisted men here to know more of <sup>the</sup> Mormon dispensation of the Gospel of Jesus Christ. I must water and care for this seed that the plants later might bear <sup>good</sup> fruits.

Thursday, Aug. 21

19 Awoke ~~at~~ <sup>with</sup> the bugle call at 6:00 am. but stayed in bed until 6:30 am. before going getting ready to go to breakfast. Spent the morning in regimental fatigue, sweeping up the camp area of the kiawe leaves that had profusely fallen upon the ground.

19 Waianae is full of kiawe trees and this camp is no exception. I noticed young children picking these leaves up and they tell me it sells for 35¢ a bag.

19 Spent some time out on the beach, and resting. Wrote a long letter to Sister Alldredge on the dedication of the Tabernacle this afternoon. Kicked the football around in the afternoon.

Thursday, Aug. 21 OCTOBER 7

<sup>19</sup> Before supper at 5 pm.

Tonite for the first time the men engaged in night firing with the .30 caliber machine guns. This was done through the aid of many searchlights.

<sup>19</sup> The firing started at 7:00 pm and continued until 11 pm. When a barrage of shots were fired they seemed like a display of skyrockets as the tracer shots were fired, bouncing upon the waves and <sup>19</sup> ricocheting high into the air.

Friday, Aug. 22

Awake at 6:00 am. Our section rushed back <sup>19</sup> to the BNG Woods to fix up our laundry to be sent out. The 1<sup>st</sup> BN packed up and left Pokai Bay while the 2<sup>nd</sup> BN went there to do their share of firing upon the water-borne targets. The "HQ" anti-tank section fired their 3 1/2 in. gun, too.

I was back at my post at the South Barrier as a telephone observer to report ~~in~~ to the Control Tower any surface craft that approached the danger zone.

Friday, Aug. 22. ~~OCTOBER 8~~

19 We stayed on our post from 12:30 pm to 5 pm when the firing was over.

Read & rested in the evening while the rest of the men in our tent played cards. The

19 HQ Anti-tank men came over to our tent and joined in the games until 11 pm. We are one of the fortunate tents that have electric lights and power for our radios.

19

Saturday, Aug. 23

Up early and breakfasted at 5:30 am. Out today to the North Barrier while Pt. Thrakara

19 took over my post at the South Barrier. The firing started from 7:00 am. to 3:00 pm. Was relieved for lunch by Sgt. Alendon. By a happy coincidence, met Sister Perkins and Lennie, her adopted daughter at the

19 beach resort of Jack Waterhouse, which is near our post at the North Barrier. They were invited by Mr. Waterhouse to spend the day at his place and they enjoyed the time swimming and fishing.

OCTOBER 9

Saturday, Aug. 22

18 Sister Pichie told me of Sister Pat's sudden illness and fatigue from overwork so I dropped in there to visit her when the firing was over. Prot. Hirahara had kindly offered to take me in in his private car to Honolulu and to come in again to Ulukoua with me. Sunday night.

19 Attended McCally for M. I. A. for the first time in a long time and truly enjoyed the program there. There was a surprisingly large attendance and especially of the gleaner girls and young men.

Bought some extra tickets to our Japanese Mission show in the Tabernacle. Dropped in the C. Yashiroka's later in the evening and she offered to help to sell the tickets I had. Left about 10 tickets with Mrs. Yashiroka.

Sunday, Aug. 24

Left home early Sunday morning to attend a Pivethood meeting at the Tomalilo School but there was none this Sunday. At the Sunday School service,

Attended the farewell meeting with our brethren from Salt Lake at the Tabernacle at 7:00 pm. To 7:30 pm, Bishop Wirthlin <sup>laid</sup> ~~was~~ out before us.

19 Fortunately for me, a truck left the Motor Pool at 7:30 am. for Pokai Bay and I was allowed to ride in it. Now that I look back on this incident, it seems an answer to my prayers.

19 Truck going there. You may ride in it. This truck carried a messenger all the way down to Pōkai Bay with a slip of paper to be signed by Lt. Kapua. The truck appearing when it did and making it possible for my early arrival at Waianae caused my heart to soften, and Pvt. Hirakura and Pvt. Up at 5:30 am for Honolulu. To Radio School from 8 am to 4 pm. I find that by not partaking of the noon meal, I can keep wide awake in the afternoon. It used to be a problem trying to concentrate in the afternoon classes because I would get so tired that my eyes <sup>would ache,</sup> ~~tear~~ from the strain. If going without the noonday meal will help me, I am going to continue doing <sup>so</sup> without. It is indeed

very discouraging on some days when I can't seem to concentrate and the dots and dashes become just a lot of noise. Then again, on other days, it is so easy to take down the code as the instructor

19 Waipahu to get ~~the~~ truckloads of coconuts and tea leaves, firewood, stones for the imu, and dig a large pit next to the mess hall for the imu. All the barracks, orderly rooms, <sup>and</sup> mess hall were scrubbed and washed down by willing hands. There was quite a bit of complaining before the men were assigned different tasks but once they got going, they pitched in with a will. Some of the men went fishing <sup>at Kaneohe</sup> for the party and they brought in about a dozen large octopus, and a few of them were really big with <sup>inches</sup> tentacles almost as large as my wrist. The radio school gang decorated the mess hall with coconut leaves & tea leaves nailed on the sides and rafters of the hall. Raining again but we hope tomorrow will be a nice <sup>clear</sup> day.

19 Saw the regimental retreat parade today, 10 yr. medals were given to half a dozen men among which was Sgt. Hojai from our Anti-tank platoon. Also, the Colonel praised the 298<sup>th</sup> men

19 who rowed for the Army team in the last Regatta in Honolulu. The large cups were presented to the winning crew captains, the senior crew having tied the Navy for first place, and the novice winning their event. The parade today was in honor of the short-timers who will be leaving us soon after, <sup>m</sup> Oct. 16 & 18

Wednesday, Oct. 15

This is our "Big" day. No Reville this am.

19 Got up at 6:30 am. and into fatigue clothes to clean up the area. Much of the work was already done yesterday, — pulling weeds and washing down the barracks. Our radio school gang attended as usual the classes down <sup>at</sup> the Tower Post. My code speed is gradually picking up. I took the procedure test on #2 lesson today. Wednesday, being half day school, we finished at 11:30 am.

Wednesday, Oct. 16 ~~DECEMBER 17~~

10 President Jensen and the 3 <sup>White</sup> Sisters, Terayawa, Torgensons, Taylor, and Elders Spoon and Jensen from Wahiawa had already been here for the last half hour and they were enjoying the

11 games and races back of the officers' quarters. Introduced Sgt. Hoopai and Pvt. Toyashi to the missionaries to be their guides in touring the grounds and showing them the equipment

12 used here. Unfortunately for me and the radio school gang, we were detailed to be writers for the leau. A good crowd of over 250 people, including many women, squeezed into

13 all available space in our mess hall and the adjoining wire shed and feasted upon the delicious roast pig and the many other dishes that go into making a leau complete.

14 Before we ate, though, President Jensen was asked by Capt. Alder (through my suggestion) to offer the blessings upon the food.

15 The two large <sup>roast</sup> pigs were gone in no time.

- <sup>19</sup> Unlike the luncheon of the A. B. & C. Co., we served no beer but only soda water. A group of Hawaiian girls serenaded with Hawaiian music while the food was served. There was <sup>special</sup> no entertainment although a platform was put up and decorated outside our orderly rooms. All in all it was a great success.

Then came the cleaning up. The men <sup>19</sup> all left with their guests for Honolulu and elsewhere so I helped the poor "K.P.'s" with their work. It didn't take very long before we had the mess hall cleaned up.

<sup>19</sup> Time seem to fly by so fast nowadays that night is upon us and the "lights out" bugle call sounds. Trying to get my <sup>personal</sup> work done before then is getting to be quite a job.

Passed # 2 procedure test with a score of 92.5. am in the 12 wpm. class which seems pretty fast at this time, but I am sure that within a week I will be able to receive quite a few more ~~code~~ groups than I did today. I hope to stay in this group <sup>code</sup> for a month so I can receive 12 wpm solid before advancing to the 16 wpm. class. One great lesson I am learning in school is the fact that success comes only through continuous, persevering practice and industry.

DECEMBER 20

Friday, Oct. 17

19 The first few days in school I was so disgusted and discouraged at my inability to receive 4 w.p.m. that I wanted to quit. It is now only two weeks since the opening of this radio school and I <sup>already</sup> ~~have~~ ~~received~~ ~~8~~ w.p.m. I am going to try hard to be able to receive 16 w.p.m. by the time my term of service in the Army is up at Dec. 9, 1941.

19 School was over at 3 pm because the last period on Fridays is used by the clean up detail to wash down the rooms. We went over to the Post Library to spend the time until 4 pm when our truck came for us. Borrowed "couple of books," "The Fool Bath Said," and "Drakes Telephone Handbook." The first book is an interesting one on Beverley Nichols' conception of Christianity and Christ.

19 the climbers. Masane Hirota, Mas's brother, is developing into a natural pole climber, — he seems to climb the pole with such ease and ~~facility~~ <sup>fluency</sup> after only one period of instructions. I gave him

19 an hour's drill <sup>last night</sup> on Code receiving lesson #1 from our radio school and I find him very quick in learning.

19 Four men from each company have been selected on a permanent special detail to usher at the football games every week <sup>night</sup> when the 298<sup>th</sup> team plays. Pfc. Strohlein, Pvt. Ushijima, Shoba, and I were selected from our company because of our <sup>appearance</sup> neat and military bearing. This means that I may have to spend most of my weekends here in Schofields. The 298<sup>th</sup> team lost a hard fought game to the 35<sup>th</sup> Infantry team by the score 13-0.

Spent the evening reading.

Sunday, Oct. 19

Staying in camp this weekend, on <sup>the</sup> 50% tent.

Up at 6:30 am to find an emission had occurred during my sleep. This is the second time that this has happened since my enlistment in the Army and on both occasions, I had fallen off

to sleep without <sup>praying for</sup> the protection of our Heavenly Father during the night. It has been my constant prayer that He might send me the light to guide me to the future mother of my children and the

thoughts and prayers have increased in intensity within the last month for my discharge from active service in the Army will come soon.

19 The forty men detailed as ushers for the football game today, used their ~~left~~ sidearms as a sign of authority on duty. This game was a "home" game so all ~~the~~ <sup>298<sup>th</sup></sup> of us ushers had to be on duty. On other games beside our "home" game, only half of the group are put on detail. Our 298<sup>th</sup> team rode roughshod over the 27<sup>th</sup> Wolfhound team by the score of 20-6. This is ~~the~~ our first victory so far, having tied the first game and lost the second.

19 After the game, I rushed to Honolulu, and dropped in at 7 pm for ~~to~~ a fine Halloween party at the ~~Anatomical Branch~~ <sup>Waikeke</sup> Chapel. Under Elder Willis' direction, the party went off swell with a large group from the Lanakila and Moiliili districts joining in the fun. There was a "House of Horror" in the basement, through which every one had to pass and if anyone had been passing <sup>the</sup> chapel at that time, <sup>they</sup> would have thought the ~~Mormons~~ <sup>women</sup> were being tortured and beaten as they yelled and screamed every time they were confronted by a goblin.


